Today's Gospel Reading: Mark 7:24-37

Time to Reflect

If you have time, look at the other lectionary readings for today i.e., Psalm 25 and James 2:1-10. There is a common theme in all of these and it is that God cares for everyone and has a particular heart for the needy and oppressed. God's compassion is not just for those who love Him but reaches out into the wider world. People can be in desperate situations, through no fault of their own, and they need help and support. Yet, there are often barriers that restrict this.

The story in Mark 7 reminds us of prejudices that existed between Jew and Gentile. A Gentile woman, who was also a Canaanite- approached Jesus seeking healing for her daughter as she believed that He was the Messiah. (Note: Canaanites were particularly shunned by Jews). In the story, the word dogs is mentioned, which was a common term for Gentiles. Jesus referred to dogs so was He highlighting this prejudice? The woman responded by saying that even she deserved mercy and Jesus responds by healing her daughter. Despite the barriers before her, the woman persevered and asked for basic care and compassion.

We live in a world of many prejudices based on such things as religion, status, race and gender. Governments may legislate against such things e.g. The UK Equality Act of 2010, but it is often the hearts of people that need to change.

Jesus came to save the world; even those we may feel are undesirable. He is the way to a new life and who are we to put barriers in the way of this? Rather, we should be showing God's love and helping people to see the nature of God and encourage them to find salvation through Jesus. And to those of us who have accepted Christ as Saviour, how has this changed our perception of the world and those around us? Covid-19 has thrown up many challenges; one being our concern for those less fortunate than ourselves. Let us take a few moments to reflect on what our response has been, and whether barriers – from ourselves and governments - are preventing some people from receiving basic care and compassion.

Couch to 5k plan with Helen Ashelby

On a serious note, I am very proud of myself; given I couldn't walk or even lay down to sleep when I was pregnant with Ella and haven't attempted running for nearly 10 years until I started this plan. If I can do it anyone can - go for it!!

HELP NEEDED

It's that time of year when our thoughts turn to "what shall we make for Christmas this year to give to the school children, congregation, youth groups etc?

In previous years, we have made angels and hearts . This year we are make baubles. They can be made in various ways e.g. knitted, crocheted, sewn, felt, card, even salt dough! A very easy knitting pattern is available attached to this newsletter or on the table at the back of Church. So whilst you are sitting in your garden or watching the rain from indoors or on your way to work, why not get making!!! Many thanks in advance

Christmas Bauble 1 DK (6) DK = DOUBLE KNITTING

Use any yarn and appropriate size needles for that yarn. Thinner yarn will make a smaller bauble.

Materials:

9mm single-pointed needles

Mission Action Group

Drops Andes varn, 1 ball (leftovers will be sufficient) toy stuffing.

Method:

Cast on 7 sts with cable cast-on method Row 1: knit

Row 2: k1, (m1, k1) 6 times. (13sts) Row 3: knit

Row 4: k1, (m1, k2) 5 times, (m1, k1) twice (20 sts) Row 5-12: knit

Row 13: (k1, k2tog) 6 times, k2 (14sts) Row 14: knit

Row 15: k2tog to end (7sts)

Row 16: knit

Cut thread and sew through last row of stitches, draw together to tighten top.

Sew side seam and stuff with filling.

Thread yarn through remaining sts and pull tight.

Sew in ends. Make hanging cord with a spare piece of yarn.

(To knit stripey bauble change to contrast colour for rows 5-6 and 9-10)

Christmas Bauble 2

Using 4.00mm needles, cast on 34 sts for small bauble or 45 sts for large bauble. Foundation row (RS) - Inc knitways once in each st ... 68 sts for small bauble or 90 sts for large bauble.

Beg Patt - 1st row (WS) - * K2, P1 tbl, K2, P6, rep from * to last 2 sts, K2.

2nd row - P2, * K6, P2, K1 tbl, P2, rep from * to end.

3rd row - As 1st row.

4th row - P2, * C6B, P2, K1 tbl, P2, rep from * to end.

5th row - As 1st row.

6th row - As 2nd row. Rows 1 to 6 inclusive form patt. Cont in patt until work measures approx 11 cm for small bauble or 17 cm for large bauble from beg, ending with a 5th row.

Next row - * K2tog, rep from * to end ... 34 sts for small bauble or 45 sts for large bauble. Break off yarn leaving a long end. Run end through rem sts, draw up tightly to close opening. Leave yarn attached.

TO MAKE UP

DO NOT PRESS. Thread end attached onto wool needle and using mattress st seam, join side edges together. Place knitted piece over ball. Work a running thread along cast on edge, draw up tightly to close opening and fasten off securely.

For Small Bauble - Using 3 strands of yarn, make a plait approx 16 cm long. Knot ends. Fold in half to form a loop and attach ends securely to top of bauble as pictured.

For Large Bauble Using 4 strands of yarn, make a twisted cord approx 24 cm long. Knot ends. Fold in half to form a loop and attach ends securely to top of bauble as pictured.





Bookings:

Please continue to book in advance to attend a Service.

Seating can then be arranged to respect family groups and social distancing as well as providing Track and Trace information if it is needed.

To book, contact **Jayne McLaren on 07859 062 692** (jayniemac@hotmail.co.uk) from 4pm on the Sunday afternoon for the following Sunday's Service.

The front and vestry doors will open 30 minutes before a service begins.

Face Coverings Still Preferred:

Many enclosed public places and spaces are keeping this safety measure while infection rates are high. Those on duty at church will be wearing face coverings for everyone's protection. We really hope you will too, especially while you are moving about or talking to others.

Hand Sanitising:

Please continue to sanitise your hands on the way in and also on leaving. If there is a queue for any reason, remember the importance of social distancing – respect other people's need for space.

Attending church:

Please do not come if you are

- showing symptoms,
- have recently come into contact with someone who is self-isolating or confirmed to Covid, or
- if you are feeling generally unwell.

Please only come to church when you feel it is safe for you to do so, especially if you are in a vulnerable group. Getting a test in the week before coming to Church will help you to know you are not a risk to others.

Meanwhile:

- The Church's Covid-safe cleaning routines will continue, and
- If you would like help setting up to receive worship via Zoom at home, please contact Jayne McLaren (07859062692) and we can arrange for someone to do that with you.

Ventilation:

Some church doors will still remain open to ensure good air circulation; please be prepared for it to be a bit draughty on occasions and bring something warm to wear.

During Worship:

- In order to minimise the risk of transmission, Services will still be shorter than previously.
- **Indoor Singing & Prayer Responses** preferably quietly, and preferably while wearing a mask are now allowed.
- **Offerings** should still be left in the boxes near the doors and will be blessed during the worship.
- Intercession Prayer requests should still be made via a Steward Elder.
- At the end of the service it is still safer if conversations are held outside.

Children & Families:

Children, young people and families are really welcome at church but, sadly, separate Junior Church cannot resume yet. However, it is hoped to re-introduce a regular all-age element to the first part of worship over the coming weeks. Meanwhile we hope the children will continue to bring drawing /writing materials of their own plus the weekly colouring sheets to complete for display on the railings. But not toys - yet.


